


## **ORUUC Volleyball**

## "The Four Seasons" by Charles Counts: An interview with Lucy Kniseley

ORUUC is filled with works of art that many of us probably pass by without a second thought. The large panels in the Hearth Room have always caught my eye, but I didn't know the story behind them. An email from Lucy Kniseley to the church office changed that.

The panels, entitled "The Four Seasons" by Charles Counts, were commissioned by Ralph Kniseley, Lucy's father, after the unexpected death of his wife, Helen Sutton Kniseley, in 1961.

Charles Counts was a Kentucky-born potter, whose family moved to

Oak Ridge in the 1940s. He graduated from Oak Ridge High School, then Berea College, and after a stint in the U.S. Army, returned to Oak Ridge and opened a pottery studio. Ralph Kniseley, a physician who later worked at the Oak Ridge Institute for Nuclear Studies, and his family moved back to Oak Ridge from California around that same time, in the late 1950s. Counts' and the Kniseleys attended ORUUC. Lucy Kniseley recalls visiting Counts' log cabin home/studio in Solway as a child, where one had to be very careful around the delicate works of art.



In 1961, tragedy struck the Kniseley family. Helen Sutton Kniseley, the Oberlin and Smith educated mother of five, passed away following routine surgery. Helen Kniseley was head of Religious Education at ORUUC. She was active in the local Arts Council and ORCMA. She was also involved in supporting local integration efforts. Lucy recalls her mother picketed at Davis Cafeteria, one of the last restaurants here in town that refused to serve people of color.



Ralph Kniseley commissioned the work shortly after his wife's death. "The church was really important to both of them," Lucy said. Lucy was 12 years old when Counts completed the piece; it was placed in the original ORUUC building across town. It was hard to see it all the time as a child, she said. A fire at the church damaged the piece, and the nameplate identifying the work got lost in the move—or perhaps there never was one. Last month, after conferring with the church office, Lucy went to a Knoxville awards shop and had a plaque made. "It's kind of emotional now," she said, looking over the artwork in the Hearth Room. Hundreds of pieces of clay create a mosaic of the seasons. "But it's nice to see it up close.


There were a lot more vivid blues before the fire." In just the right light—sunshine reflecting off melting remnants of a recent snow—those blues still shine through.

Lucy attended Antioch University in Ohio, then nursing school at UT, where she became a psychiatric nurse practitioner. She married, had two sons, lived in Italy, divorced, remarried, and retired. Her husband, Toby Boulet, teaches engineering at UT. She's happy with the trajectory of her life.

Her father, who also remarried, traveled overseas, delivered babies in Idaho, and ended up back in Oak Ridge. He passed away in 2017. In his final years at Commonwealth, he painted. It was a way for him to connect and interact with other residents and staff. Initially, Lucy was concerned that the paint supplies and the mess that goes along with creating art might take over his apartment. It turned out to be a wonderful thing, she said.

Lucy had an interest in photography, but never tried her hand at other forms of art, until last spring. She decided to take a drawing class at the Oak Ridge Art Center. Working with charcoal and ink, she found she liked it, and the people there, too. Now she's trying a watercolor class. "I've been wanting to, but never had the nerve," she said. "It's something that's scary to do, but so worth it."



## Split the Plate for January Ecumenical Storehouse



The Ecumenical Storehouse provides household items to those in the community who cannot afford them. They accept donations of furniture, appliances and household goods (linens, dishes, cookware), and distribute them, free of charge, to needy families in the local 3-county region. The Storehouse works with the United Way, ADFAC, and many other organizations to reach those in need. Clients are vetted by local social service agencies and churches. Special consideration is given to those families for whom a fire has left them in a desperate situation. Run by a cooperative of Oak Ridge churches including ORUUC, Ecumenical Storehouse has been in operation since 1984.

Ecumenical Storehouse embodies the social action that ORUUC champions. The church is a founding member of the Storehouse. The Storehouse runs a very lean operation and has an all-volunteer organization and very modest budget. Its service in recycling used furniture and household goods back into society is a very green operation. We strive to maintain the Storehouse in a manner that supports our seven principles and serves as good outreach to our broader community. With your help, we can continue our membership in this organization.
