On Discernment

Rev. Lisa Romantum Schwartz, Interim Minister

Think about it: As you read this, "somewhere out there" the new minister for ORUUC is ... well, we don't really know. They may be walking on the beach or playing pickleball or taking a nap, or maybe even sitting before their computer honing their ministerial record for their upcoming search. But rest assured, your next minister is alive and engaged in the world, somewhere. (And if prayer is part of your spiritual practice, you might start lifting that person up!)

The new minister is already engaged in a process of discernment: they're weighing ideas and hopes and dreams about a new settlement, yearning to find a congregation that resonates in the same frequency as they do. They're looking for a place where willing people will share a sense of mission, and share in the ministry that makes the mission real in the world.

This year ORUUC will dive deep into the realm of discernment, too. What skills do you (the collective you, but also you personally) need from a pastor, a preacher, a prophet? (Maybe take a moment and write down your top three.) A few years ago, the UU Minister's Association (UUMA) came up with a list of nine duties that ministers should have skills in: Preaching/ Leading Worship, Officiating Rites of Passage, Pastoral Care, Encouraging Spiritual Development, Witnessing to Justice in the Public Square, Administration, the Pursuit of Renewal and Professional Development, Serving the Larger UU Faith, and Leading the Faith into the Future. The UUMA was quick to

point out that no minister is excellent in all nine of these areas; sometimes someone is simply proficient, or even still learning one of the roles. And when a church is

beginning the exciting and arduous process of searching for their next settled minister, part of the discernment process is figuring out where your congregation wants, needs, and expects excellence, and where you can accept proficiency, or even a learning curve.

Part of discernment is pretty straightforward. And partly it's about listening to your heart. It'll be an exciting time, sometimes a frustrating time as needs and opinions collide (remember the definition of conflict is simply where two ideas exist together in the same space and time), and a richly rewarding time. I'm excited to be in this work with you.

While Fresh Fruit for Kids was limited in their service during the pandemic, they resumed deliveries in 2022, providing fresh fruit to nearly 450 children per week. This effort to alleviate hunger is social justice work that helps reduce instances of behavioral difficulties.


Coffeehouse Talent Show Friday, Sept. 22


This beautiful display will be up through the end of August. At that time, the cranes will be boxed up and mailed to Hiroshima, Japan, where they will be placed at the Children's Peace Monument. The monument commemorates Sadako Sasaki and the thousands of child victims of the atomic bombing of Hiroshima. Sadako, featured in Rev. Lisa's Story for All Ages last Sunday— "Sadako and the Thousand Paper Cranes," written by Canadian-American author Eleanor Coerr—died at the age of 12 of leukemia from radiation from the atomic bomb that was dropped on Hiroshima on August 6, 1945. The Sanctuary cranes were made in honor of Shigeko Uppuluri, whose Celebration of Life was held at ORUUC earlier this month. https://www.knoxnews.com/obituaries/knso59755

Ministerial Search Update July 2023

As the summer settles over us like a warm, steamy blanket; the ministerial search committee has begun meeting. Our two gatherings thus far have been very informal, with lots of snacks and ice-breaker questions, mostly geared toward settling into the task before us and learning how we will work best together.


One sentiment we've all shared is the great honor each of us feels at being called to serve ORUUC in this way. Each of us arrived at the decision with thoughtfulness and take very seriously the opportunity to do the hard labor necessary to accurately reflect the will and wishes of the congregation.

One thing we noticed is that the <u>ministerial search timeline</u> that has been shared thus far gets a little murky after the congregation votes on the committee. To that end, we thought we'd share more of a timeline of what search will look like (and what to look out for), including date estimates.

Roughly, the search is conducted in seven general phases. We've already finished phase one (The Good Goodbye) and phase two (electing the search committee), so pat yourselves on the back for a job well done! The next big lift is phase 3, "Building the Structure to Search." Major elements of this phase include.

- <u>August Search Committee retreat:</u> Facilitated by representatives from the UUA, we will make a search covenant and take a deep dive into the roles and tasks necessary for our work on behalf of the congregation.
- <u>September-ish A congregational survey:</u> Thoughtfully crafted by the UUA Transitions Team and regional staff, this survey will be made available to every member of the church and includes questions that emphasize what the congregation needs from a new minister.
- <u>November-ish Cottage meetings/focus groups:</u> Smaller group gatherings, these meetings are an invitation to participate in group conversations to hear and build on what others say about ORUUC.

Phase 4 and beyond will start in winter of 2023, and there's plenty to keep us busy in the meantime. We've created a <u>Ministerial Search Hub</u> in the Members' Section of the website. You can find open meeting recordings, updates, general information, and more. We hope you will bookmark this page and check back often. Until next time, we appreciate your trust and support of us all as we embark on this grand adventure.

Learning about the Eastern Cherokee A UU Living our Values Field Trip Saturday, Sept. 30 Organized by TVUUC



As Unitarian Universalists, we are committed to honoring the first nations peoples who stewarded and inhabited North America prior to settler colonialism. As part of living our values, we can learn directly from local indigenous peoples about their histories, cultures, and contemporary lived experiences. Join with other UU's to honor the Eastern Cherokee people by visiting:

- Oconaluftee Indian Village: on the site of a traditional village, where tribal members educate the public about their culture and lifeways (our group will have a private, guided tour) \$20 per adult, children 6-12 yrs \$10, children under 10 free.
- The Museum of the Cherokee Indian: one of the oldest tribally run museums in the US, this museum includes historical and archaeological exhibits, cultural specialists demonstrating crafts and skills, and a bookstore/giftshop with an excellent collection of books on Cherokee culture. Cost: optional (\$12 if you choose to view the exhibits; the bookstore is free to enter).
- Qualla Arts and Crafts store: Across the street from the museum, this store offers the work of native artists from around the US, with a focus on local Cherokee artists. Free to enter.

Scholarship support is available for anyone who needs it. You can also donate to the scholarship fund.

Transportation: We are currently planning on carpooling; please let us know if you need transportation support. We will meet in Cherokee at 10 am Eastern Time and be there until approximately 4 pm.
