

Water Communion: Let's Reconstitute Our Community

In 1980, two Unitarian Universalist women—Carolyn McDade and Lucile Schuck Longview—were asked to create a worship service for the Women and Religion Continental Convocation of Unitarian Universalists.

As they shaped that service, McDade and Longview wanted to create a new ritual "that spoke to our connectedness to one another, to the totality of life, and to our place on this planet." They included a new, inclusive symbol of women's spirituality: water.

They write, "Water is more than simply a metaphor. It is elemental and primary, calling forth feelings of awe and reverence. Acknowledging that the ocean is considered by many to be the place from which all life on our planet came—it is the womb of life—and that amniotic waters surround each of us prenatally, we now realize that [this worship service] was for us a new story of creation... We choose water as our symbol of our empowerment."

Many UU congregations now hold a Water Communion once a year, often at the beginning of the new church year. Members bring to the service a small amount of water from a place that is special to them. During the appointed time in the service, people one by one pour their water together into a large bowl. As the water is added, the person who brought it shares how this water is special to them. The combined water is symbolic of our shared faith coming from many different sources.

This Month's Split the Plate Offering:

The Split-the-Plate recipient for the month of August is Fresh Fruit for Kids. This shared ministry group supplements Second Harvest's backpack program with fresh fruit. Since it was started by Elizabeth Peelle in 2012, this program has delivered over 17,000 pieces of fruit to area school children. While Fresh Fruit for Kids was limited in their service during the pandemic, they resumed deliveries in 2022, providing fresh fruit to nearly 450 children per week. This effort to alleviate hunger is social justice work that helps reduce instances of behavioral difficulties.



This beautiful display will be up through this Sunday, Aug. 27. Next week, the cranes will be boxed up and mailed to Hiroshima, Japan, where they will be placed at the Children's Peace Monument. The monument commemorates Sadako Sasaki and the thousands of child victims of the atomic bombing of Hiroshima. Sadako, featured in Rev. Lisa's Story for All Ages on Sunday, Aug. 6— "Sadako and the Thousand Paper Cranes," written by Canadian-American author Eleanor Coerr—died at the age of 12 of leukemia from radiation from the atomic bomb that was dropped on Hiroshima on August 6, 1945. We'll gratefully accept the following items in <u>resalable</u> condition:

- Clothing & Linens: Washed, no tears, stains, mildewed, or strong odors from cigarettes, pets or mothballs. It would be helpful to fold clothing and put in clean trash bags.
- **Upholstered Furniture & Area Rugs**: No significant tears, no stains, no mildew, or strong cigarette or pet odors.
- Wood or Solid Furniture: Not broken or badly dented or water damaged, and not missing any vital parts. Minor dents or scratches are acceptable.
- **Televisions**: Flat screens, still in good working condition, less than 5 years old, with no missing nobs or buttons. Minor dents or scratches are acceptable. No big projection TVs or consoles.
- **Electronics**: Still in good working condition stereo components and speakers, computers only with flat screen monitors.
- **Appliances**: Only small, still in good working condition such as toasters and microwave ovens, mixers, etc. No missing knobs or buttons. Minor dents or scratches are acceptable.

Learning about the Eastern Cherokee A UU Living our Values Field Trip Saturday, Sept. 30 Organized by TVUUC



As Unitarian Universalists, we are committed to honoring the first nations peoples who stewarded and inhabited North America prior to settler colonialism. As part of living our values, we can learn directly from local indigenous peoples about their histories, cultures, and contemporary lived experiences. Join with other UU's to honor the Eastern Cherokee people by visiting:

- Oconaluftee Indian Village: on the site of a traditional village, where tribal members educate the public about their culture and lifeways (our group will have a private, guided tour) \$20 per adult, children 6-12 yrs \$10, children under 10 free.
- The Museum of the Cherokee Indian: one of the oldest tribally run museums in the US, this museum includes historical and archaeological exhibits, cultural specialists demonstrating crafts and skills, and a bookstore/giftshop with an excellent collection of books on Cherokee culture. Cost: optional (\$12 if you choose to view the exhibits; the bookstore is free to enter).
- Qualla Arts and Crafts store: Across the street from the museum, this store offers the work of native artists from around the US, with a focus on local Cherokee artists. Free to enter.

Scholarship support is available for anyone who needs it. You can also donate to the scholarship fund.

Transportation: We are currently planning on carpooling; please let us know if you need transportation support. We will meet in Cherokee at 10 am Eastern Time and be there until approximately 4 pm.

Sunday, Sept. 3 Putting Labor back in Labor Day



The Rev. Dr. David Breeden says, "In the face of the tragic meltdown of the political process here in the United States, in the face of a media utterly unconcerned with issues of justice and equity, the religious voice appears to be one of the last holdouts against forces such as neo-liberal hypercapitalism and globalization. To paraphrase Max Horkheimer, without the 'totally Other' in the end materialism triumphs. Without the 'totally Other' in the end greed triumphs.
