Faith Formation: Living Lives Centered in Love

Welcome to a new year in Youth Faith Formation! Our Worship theme of Discernment in August invites us not only to consider how we do Youth Faith Formation, but also to remind ourselves why we do it.

Our UU Faith is the underlying beliefs, values, and traditions that sustain and ground us. It's the moral compass that guides our decision-making. Our faith calls us into deeper connection with the sacred and each other. It holds us through life's inevitable suffering and uncertainty.

Faith formation is the process of awakening, developing, understanding and ultimately living these ideals. It's how we decide what it means to live with integrity, to advocate for justice, to show our authentic selves. It's how we show up for our beliefs, pursue right relationships, especially our intimate ones. It's how we make meaning in our lives and connect with something greater than ourselves.

That's a tall order. How do we do that? We practice. We do it over and over with intention, patience and dedication. As individuals, we do it through ritual and reflection. And as a community, we do it by sharing our joys and sorrows, laughter and tears, and many milestones in between. Here at

ORUUC, we practice living lives based on the values, traditions, and aspirations that our faith tells us are worthy of being fully alive.

It's not a group, a curriculum, a leader or even a minister that forms a faith. It's the process of seeking meaning, forming relationships, learning, forgetting, relearning, changing and growing in our understanding of how to live an authentic life with integrity. Faith is the commitment we make within ourselves and with each

other to practice living lives centered in love.

Faith Formation is the process of getting us there. It's every interaction in our congregation. It's rolling tamales and washing cars. It's checking in with small groups. It's making over 1,600 origami cranes. It's forming a covenant. It's facing conflict with compassion. It's stepping away when needing some rest and reflection. It's serving on the Board or the Memorial Team. It's sorting baby clothes at the Rummage Sale. It's finding a new minister.

I think you get the picture. It's you. It's me. It's we. It's all the big and small ways we practice living into flourishing lives. There are many opportunities to practice. I encourage you to participate in this community, because forming a faith centered in love requires each of us.

On August 6th, 1945, the U.S. was the first to use a nuclear weapon in war. Most Oak Ridgers know that our community was a "secret city" whose purpose was to enrich uranium for that bomb. The August 6th bombing of Hiroshima and the subsequent bombing of Nagasaki effectively ended WWII, saving countless lives. Yet the two bombs not only instantly killed 120,000 humans (and sickened more), they opened Pandora's box as they ushered in a new era of destructive potential. Rev. Lisa will explore the moral dilemma.

The Split-the-Plate recipient for the month of August is Fresh Fruit for Kids. This shared ministry group supplements Second Harvest's backpack program with fresh fruit. Since it was started by Elizabeth Peelle in 2012, this program has delivered over 17,000 pieces of fruit to area school children. While Fresh Fruit for Kids was limited in their service during the pandemic, they resumed deliveries in 2022, providing fresh fruit to nearly 450 children per week. This effort to alleviate hunger is social justice work that helps reduce instances of behavioral difficulties.

Days of Peace and Remembrance Sunday, August 6, 2023 at 6:48 a.m. (Sunrise)

International Friendship Bell & Peace Pavilion at A. K. Bissell Park 1401 Oak Ridge Turnpike Free and open to the public

Each year, the Manhattan Project National Historic Park hosts "Days of Peace and Remembrance" at its three sites across the country to commemorate and reflect on the number of years since the atomic bombings of Japan. In Oak Ridge, there will be a sunrise ceremony (6:48 AM EDT) on Sunday, August 6 at the Peace Pavilion in A. K. Bissell Park, when the International Friendship Bell will be rung 78 times to commemorate and reflect on the number of years since the atomic bombing of Hiroshima, Japan. A string quartet from the Oak Ridge Symphony Orchestra will provide accompanying music. The ceremony will allow for somber, quiet reflection and members of the public are invited to ring the bell for any reason that speaks to them. One hour before dawn, park rangers will light luminarias that have been decorated with messages of peace by community members. The luminarias will remain lit throughout the event.

For those who are unable to attend the August 6 event in person a virtual bell ringing will be available from 6:00 a.m. EDT on August 6 through 11:59 p.m. PDT on August 9. You may read more about the event HERE.

Celebration of Life for Shigeko Uppuluri August 5 at ORUUC



Shigeko Yoshino Uppuluri, of Oak Ridge, died peacefully at the Alexander Guest House on June 8, 2023, after a brief stay there.

Born in Kyoto, Japan, on April 9, 1931, she was the daughter of the late Moichi and Yae Yoshino.

In the mid-1950s, Shigeko enrolled at Indiana University, in Bloomington, IN, to pursue a Master's Degree in Anthropology. There she met her late husband, Venkata Ramamohana Rao (Ram) Uppuluri, a native of India, who was pursuing his Ph.D. in Mathematical Statistics. Their son, Ram Yoshino Uppuluri, was born in Bloomington in

1961.

In the late 1970s, Shigeko started working as a translator of technical papers at ORNL. During the 1980s, she helped establish the first Japanese language instruction program at the University of Tennessee in Knoxville, in the Department of Religious Studies.

In the early 1990s, Shigeko was instrumental in setting up the Oak Ridge Sister City Exchange Program with Naka City, Japan. She and Ram Sr. were also instrumental in proposing the International Friendship Bell Project which was adopted as an official project of the City of Oak Ridge's 50th Birthday Celebration in 1993.

After Ram Sr. died in 1995, Shigeko continued to remain actively involved in many community organizations. She was a reliable presence at local international fairs and festivals, and a willing ambassador, interpreter, or translator of Japanese language, culture, and customs.

In 2016, the Consul-General of Japan presented Shigeko with the Foreign Minister's Commendation Award, recognizing her contributions to the friendship and understanding between Oak Ridge and Japan.

She is survived by her son, Ram Y. Uppuluri of Oak Ridge; grandson, Adam Krieger Uppuluri, of Washington, DC; brother Shozo Yoshino, of Kyoto, Japan; sister Hisako Nakai, of Nagoya, Japan; and brother, Shigeki Yoshino (Ritsuko), of Shirahama, Japan; as well as numerous nieces and nephews and grand nieces and nephews.

For months, a vocal minority in Anderson County has challenged books in our Anderson County libraries and demanded that these books be removed from the library. Now the book banners have created a petition demanding that the books be banned. In response, a petition has been written to demonstrate support for the Library Board and our professional library staff. Through this petition, we aim to demonstrate to our County Commissioners that there is broad community support for our dedicated librarians. Additionally, we seek the endorsement of the County Commission for the changes recommended by the county law director. By doing so, we can establish a united front, fostering an environment that upholds intellectual freedom and ensures the continued success of our libraries as valuable community resources. The paper petition is intended for Anderson County residents only, and will be presented at the County Commission's August 21 meeting. 

Ministerial Search Update July 2023

As the summer settles over us like a warm, steamy blanket; the ministerial search committee has begun meeting. Our two gatherings thus far have been very informal, with lots of snacks and ice-breaker questions, mostly geared toward settling into the task before us and learning how we will work best together.

One sentiment we've all shared is the great honor each of us feels at being called to serve ORUUC in this way. Each of us arrived at the decision with thoughtfulness and take very seriously the opportunity to do the hard labor necessary to accurately reflect the will and wishes of the congregation.

One thing we noticed is that the <u>ministerial search timeline</u> that has been shared thus far gets a little murky after the congregation votes on the committee. To that end, we thought we'd share more of a timeline of what search will look like (and what to look out for), including date estimates.

Roughly, the search is conducted in seven general phases. We've already finished phase one (The Good Goodbye) and phase two (electing the search committee), so pat yourselves on the back for a job well done! The next big lift is phase 3, "Building the Structure to Search." Major elements of this phase include.

- <u>August Search Committee retreat:</u> Facilitated by representatives from the UUA, we will make a search covenant and take a deep dive into the roles and tasks necessary for our work on behalf of the congregation.
- <u>September-ish A congregational survey:</u> Thoughtfully crafted by the UUA Transitions Team and regional staff, this survey will be made available to every member of the church and includes questions that emphasize what the congregation needs from a new minister.
- <u>November-ish Cottage meetings/focus groups:</u> Smaller group gatherings, these meetings are an invitation to participate in group conversations to hear and build on what others say about ORUUC.

Phase 4 and beyond will start in winter of 2023, and there's plenty to keep us busy in the meantime. We've created a Ministerial Search Hub in the Members' Section of the website. You can find open meeting recordings, updates, general information, and more. We hope you will bookmark this page and check back often. Until next time, we appreciate your trust and support of us all as we embark on this grand adventure.
