Traditions That Sustain: Twenty Years of No Rehearse Pageants

The birth of Jesus is a story that's familiar to most people. His earthly parents, Joseph and Mary, are turned away from an inn and sent out in the cold to a barn. Jesus is born there, wrapped in rags, and placed in a manger. But something is special about this baby, he is adored by shepherds, animals, kings, and even celestial beings. On the surface, this is an ordinary event, but something deeper and more powerful has happened here,

something extraordinary.

And yet, for the last 20 years, ORUUC has told this story in our No Rehearse Pageant. Each year, with very little preparation, people attending our service that day put on a costume and become animals, stars, angels, and wise people. They

also become butterflies, a rainbow pony, and dragons (3 of them). It's silly, joyful, and lots of fun. For many in our congregation, it's one of the highlights of the year.

Over the course of about an hour, a group of people with little to no preparation come together to reenact one of the most iconic

stories ever told. Usually a feat like this requires months of planning, hours of practice, and lots of repetition. The No Rehearse Pageant has none of these, and it shows. But what it does

offer is serendipity and joy in the midst of imperfection.

Over the years as I have participated and now organize this production, and despite the frivolity, I see the holy in this endeavor. Not because it depicts the birth of God, but because it makes the ordinary extraordinary.

I imagine it's what it feels like to go to a dirty, messy barn and then encounter the divine.

The first Planned Parenthood chapter in the state was formed in Oak Ridge in 1961, and many of the first volunteers and board members were from ORUUC. Not only does Planned Parenthood provide birth control, STD testing, cancer screenings, AIDS testing and wellness visits, they provide truthful, accurate information regarding human sexuality and reproduction. In this age of misinformation, the truth is a most valuable resource.

Since the Supreme Court decision to abolish Roe v. Wade, PPTMN has hired

Navigators to provide information about other states that will still provide abortions to their patients; they are also building a new clinic in southeast Illinois to serve Tennesseans in a state that is close to Tennessee that does not oppose abortions. 



Thoughts from The Mountain Sarah Gunter, CON advisor



This weekend I had great fun with Brandon White and Robyn Knouff Naughton taking the high schoolers up to "The Mountain" for the fall Mountain Con at The Mountain Learning and Retreat Center along with a huge group of 13 kids.

For those who do not know, The Mountain is a beautiful retreat, center composed of cabins, a large, and housing along with a huge community farm founded by Unitarian Universalists who bought the property originally built in the 30s as a retreat for girls to learn outdoor activities. The Southeast UUs bought the property in 1979 and envisioned as a UU retreat center where UUs from all over could come and be together. The property is on top of Ole Scaly Mountain in Highlands, NC.

The center offers Mountain Cons twice a year for second graders up to senior high and our church has always been a supporter by sending youth groups up there, along with trusted and responsible adults, who advise the kids during the weekend.

They also have family summer camps, farm camp, adventure camp, and even adult summer camp in the summers which fill up quickly.

They are currently looking for young adults to work this summer at the summer camps. They provide housing and pay. The Mountain is also known as a place that features some communal living for those who volunteer a certain amount of hours a week and don't mind living in quite minimal but beautiful surroundings. There will be a need for summer cooks, farmers, and other staff. It's a great opportunity and a way to connect with the wider UU community.

The magic that happens on the mountain has inspired me lately so much especially as our church is going through so many changes.




