The Mystery of Faith

As a devotee of Masterpiece Mystery and strangely unknowable. an avid reader of detective novels, I love a good whodunit. The suspicion, the intrigue, the red herrings, the tension....and the big reveal at the end. I am delighted when all the over-the-top characters anxiously gather together and listen to the allknowing and articulate detective tell everyone what happened, why it happened, and most importantly, who was to blame.

As much as I would like to say that I love mystery, I have come to realize that what I

really love is resolution. At the end of a whodunit, either I have figured out who did it (this rarely happens), or some pretentious know it all is going to tell me. It's all going to come to a definitive, though frequently illogical, end.

For me, the hardest part of a real mystery is that usually there is no real resolution. It's by nature something not to be understood, and Hercules Poirot is not there to explain it. A true mystery challenges us because we are confronted with uncertainty and no clear way to resolve it. That's scary.

Mystery accompanies us throughout our lives, from the miraculous moment it begins at birth, to the moment it ends, punctuated with many ordinary, but nonetheless confusing moments along the way. Our lives are acutely real, yet

Fortunately for us, demonstrating courage through fear is a trademark of a detective story and of faith. While we rarely fully grasp the complexity of many of the situations life presents us, faith can guide and sustain us through the search.

Faith is finding meaning in the unknowable, the unsolvable, and the unattainable. It's finding connection and blessing in uncertainty. It's asking us not to solve the mystery, but to learn, grow and embrace the wisdom of the process.

> As much as I would love to have it all figured out, know all the answers, and get to tell everyone (and have a really cool accent and sophisticated yet elusive demeanor), I do not. What

I do have is a faith that encourages me to look for clues, ask questions, and think intently and deeply about what it all means.

Most importantly, I have a supportive and loving community to share in the search. This December, we have SO MANY opportunities to connect with each other; fortunately, not every aspect of ORUUC life is a mystery, so scroll down to find out what and when they are.

And take time this December to wander in mystery and leave it unresolved.







Congregational Meeting Sunday, Dec. 10 at 11:15 a.m.

The Congregational Meeting is scheduled for Sunday, Dec. 10 following morning worship. There are several proposed bylaws changes (see below) that will be up for a vote at that time. The charter and bylaws committee (Jane Flanagan, Ann Miller, Freddie Nechtow, and Kara Raymond) were tasked with making the membership section of the bylaws more streamlined, and making the language between maintaining membership and removal match more closely, and also be more easily measurable. A representative from the Board and Bylaws committee will be on hand after worship this Sunday if anyone in the congregation has questions or comments.

ARTICLE III. MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1. ELIGIBILITY

Membership in ORUUC is open to any person who is in accord with the purposes and principles of Unitarian Universalism and who meets the requirements of this article, regardless of age, race, color, creed, gender, sexual orientation, gender identity, or ability.

SECTION 2. RIGHTS

Members may:

- A. Vote in congregational meetings, provided they have been members for at least four weeks prior to the meeting.
- B. Serve on all church committees, except that a member must be at least eighteen years of age to serve on the ORUUC Board of Trustees (hereafter referred to as the Board).

SECTION 3. BECOMING A MEMBER 1

Prospective members shall:

- Affirm that they are familiar with Unitarian Universalist (UU) principles and practices by attending services and
 completing new member classes; by having been members of another UU congregation; or by having participated in a
 UU church religious-education program.
- · Meet with the Minister in a group or individually.
- Complete a membership commitment card which includes pledge information.²
- · After completing the preceding steps, be confirmed by a majority vote of the Board.

SECTION 4. MAINTAINING MEMBERSHIP3

Each year, members shall complete a recommitment card containing pledge information, which can be changed by notifying the church office or minister. Members are encouraged to participate in church life. 4

SECTION 5. REMOVAL

- · A member may voluntarily separate from membership by written or oral request to the Board.
- A member who has either not completed a re-commitment card or not followed through on the previous year's pledge
 and does not respond to written letters from the Board may be removed from membership by a majority vote of the
 Board following appropriate inquiry and thirty days' notice. §
- A member may be removed from membership by a two-thirds vote of the Board for actions that threaten the wellbeing of the congregation.

¹ Previously "Section 4. Process"

² Previously "Complete the appropriate membership card and new-member pledge card."

³ Previously "Section 3. Responsibilities"

⁴ Previously "In accordance with their abilities, all members are expected to participate in the life of ORUUC, pledge and provide financial support, and support ORUUC with volunteer time."

⁵ Previously "A member who has ceased to participate in ORUUC activities, has failed to pledge for one year, and/or does not respond to written letters from the Board may be removed from membership by a majority vote of the Board following appropriate inquiry and thirty days' notice."
