

Hugs n' Quiches - The Power of Love

Mark your calendars for the potluck brunch at ORUUC on February 12th. Bring a quiche or frittata; ORUUC will provide salad, a vegan vegetable soup, and dessert. After we eat we'll discuss the proposed changes to (or possibly elimination of) UU's Seven Principles.

A major revision of our beloved principles is a lot to chew on, and gathering over a comforting meal in order to have a deep theological discussion has a long precedent in church history (we won't ask everyone to line up on a single side of the table for a portrait, a la Leonardo DaVinci). Here's the story of the meal called "Hugs n' Quiches."

In 1981, the first cases of AIDS began to be reported, and it ballooned into an epidemic by the middle of the decade. Unfazed, at the UU Fellowship in Topeka (UUFT) we went beyond "tolerance," warmly welcoming GLBTQ people and teaching "About Your Sexuality" (the predecessor of Our Whole Lives) to teens, affirming human sexuality in its beautiful variety.

Toby Scanland, an openly gay man, was one of UUFT's stalwart leaders. In the mid-80s Toby's health began to decline, and his friends in the congregation responded in the usual way by bringing soup and helping out. Eventually Toby

got the dreaded diagnosis: He had AIDS.

There was a lot of hysteria about AIDS in those dark days, and what <u>could</u> have happened was that people slowly backed away from Toby, sending "thoughts and prayers" as they beat a hasty retreat. What actually <u>did</u> happen was that members and friends of the UUFT quickly formed a task force of volunteers to provide food, companionship, light housekeeping, and other support to Toby.

There were no drugs to combat AIDS back in the day; Toby Scanland was one of over 100,000 people who died of AIDS during the 1980s. His death hung heavily over the congregation in the gloomy Kansas

winter. As Valentine's Day approached, a few of Toby's friends began to imagine using the day to mark a celebration of human love, especially the kind of caring support that had been offered to Toby.

Several members began to put together a worship service and a potluck featuring quiches. At UUFT, Hugs n' Quiches became an annual event (a tradition unbroken until the Pandemic). An organization called the Topeka AIDS Project was created, and continues to provide services today as Positive Connections. Toby's memory lives on at UUFT. I don't know if "Hugs n' Quiches" will become a tradition at ORUUC, but I know that core value of human love is active in this congregation.

This Sunday, Feb. 5 Journey through the Wilderness

The sages say, "people who don't understand their past are doomed to repeat it." On this first Sunday of Black History Month, Interim Minister Rev. This Shared Ministry group invites all church members and visitors to an informative meeting in the Sanctuary on Feb 5 during the hour after Sunday's service break. This meeting is to better inform members of the importance of changing states' electoral laws for Presidential elections. Our goal is to get a majority of ORUUC members to sign a request for changing Tennessee electoral law and use our success to convince other states' UUA congregations to follow our example. There are 1030 other congregations and 87000 UUs in the USA. We intend to notify the UUA and ask them to join the effort. Our desire in this ministry is to stop the egregious violation of the UUA 5th principle which advocates democratic methods in society.

Aid to Distressed Families of Appalachian Counties

Our Split-the-Plate offering for February is Aid to Distressed Families of Appalachian Counties (ADFAC). ADFAC began in the mid 1980's as a local ecumenical effort to provide assistance to impoverished families. As the broad needs of the low-income community became evident, the faith-based collaborative moved to become a 501(c)(3) public charity in January 1987. Over the years, ADFAC has honored its roots by developing a variety of programs designed to meet unfilled needs in the community, and currently answers over 6,000 requests for assistance each year.



ADFAC is the prime and preeminent social service agency in Oak Ridge and surrounding counties. Not only does ADFAC provide direct services to our needy community, it is also the clearing house for most other local social service agencies and churches. 


Lunch with the League

February Worship Theme: Centered in Love



The UUA's Article 2 Study Commission, tasked with reviewing and revising our Seven Principles, has proposed doing away with the linear list of principles altogether. Under discussion is a move to lift up our shared values, which they center in love. UU lay leader Tanya Webster has made a helpful graphic for us to experience the concepts more deeply.

This month, we'll be exploring what it might mean to embody this new way of conceptualizing our lives as Unitarian Universalists as we shape our living tradition in the 21st century. How does the idea, and the graphic, make you feel? What is at the core of your UU faith that is, or isn't expressed here? Plan to stay for a lunch and discussion of these changes after the service next Sunday, Feb. 12.

Note: To move forward with the idea of taking the "Principles" language out of our UUA bylaws does not mean individuals or congregations have to abandon our principles. And after this February thru May discussion period, a 2/3 majority of delegates to General Assembly (GA) in June '23 must affirm the idea in order for it to be considered further. A final vote on whether to adopt this bold new idea won't happen till GA in 2024, and there will be many opportunities to gather at the local and regional level to discuss the proposed changes in the next few months. ~Rev. Free talk on American Black religious music TODAY, February 3, at the Y-12 New Hope Center

February is Black History Month, and a new cultural exploration series in Oak Ridge called "Roots of America" will open with a free Feb. 3 talk on "Roots of American Black Music and Its Influence on American Culture." The speaker will be John Fleming, immediate past director of the National African American Music Museum in Nashville. Following a 5:00 p.m. reception for the speaker with food, he will deliver his Friday talk at 5:30 p.m. at the Y-12 New Hope Center, 602 Scarboro Rd.

Fleming will speak on the roots of African-American religious music in Africa, how African-American music emerged as Black music during slavery, how Black music evolved in the post-Civil War era from slave songs to spirituals to gospel music, and the impact of African-American music on traditional white religious music.

Fleming was the founding director of the National Afro-American Museum and Cultural Center and was involved in developing six museums. They include the National Underground Railroad Freedom Center, the Mississippi Civil Rights Museum and the National Museum of African American Music.

He was appointed by President Bush to serve on the Commission for the Smithsonian Institution's National Museum of African-American History and Culture.

Fleming is the author of the books "The Lengthening Shadow of Slavery," "The Case for Affirmative Action for Blacks in Higher Education" and "A Summer Remembered," his memoir about growing up in North Carolina in the 1950s. He is currently writing a memoir on his Peace Corps experience in Malawi.

The purpose of the "Roots of America" series of free presentations is to educate the public about the achievements and challenges of various ethnic groups that have made America strong.
