Josh's wife, Jennifer, shared an update this week: "Josh's recovery from live donor liver transplant (thank you, Jenna Lukis!) has definitely been the most challenging thing Josh and I have ever been through in our almost 22 years together, and it's not over yet. There have been complications, and additional procedures, and times when I began to wonder if he was going to be ok. There is still an immense amount of healing ahead, but I do believe he's over the worst of it now. Thank you all for the prayers, love, time, meals, and financial support you have provided and continue to provide for our family and Jenna's family. We couldn't have done any of this without all of you!"

Black History Is More Than The Civil Rights Movement

Among my childhood board games was a small cardboard canister of Charades printed on popsicle sticks. My favorite to enact was by Patrick Henry: Give me liberty, or give me death! I knew he was one of America's Revolutionary heroes, and I imagined him saying the line while under fire from British muskets. (He delivered his bold declaration during a speech in the peaceful confines of St. John's Church during the Second Virginia Convention.)

I didn't know about Patrick Henry's claim of ownership of over a hundred human beings, or that the graves of three generations of enslaved people are still part of the historical site of Henry's plantation in Virginia (his other two properties that depended on the labors of enslaved people were in New York).

I wonder what Patrick Henry would have made of this statement by Harriet Tubman: "I had reasoned this out in my mind; there was one of two things I had a right to; LIBERTY, OR DEATH: If I could not have one, I would have the other; for no man should take me alive."

I guarantee that Tubman's revolutionary words weren't stamped onto popsicle sticks and tucked into Charades sets. While we were taught to revere the brave revolutionary spirit of white men we called "Fathers of the Nation," most of us were denied the history of revolutionary Blacks who fought for their own liberation.

Contrary to what was taught in American classrooms for more than a century, enslaved Africans and African Americans fought for freedom from colonial days to the Civil War. The Stono Rebellion of 1739 was the first documented revolt, and just two years later The New York Conspiracy ignited fires and tempers and resulted in public hangings and burnings at the stake of Black revolutionaries.

The list goes on: Gabriel's Conspiracy in 1800; the German Coast Uprising of 1811; Nat Turner's Rebellion in 1831. Modern scholars find evidence of 313 revolutions of enslaved people on Colonial or American soil. All resulted in horrific, deadly consequences for the rebels, all of whom had heard the rallying cry: I have a right to liberty, or death: If I cannot have one. I will have the other.

Why are you reading this in your church newsletter? (Congratulations, BTW, for reading your church newsletter.) Because Black history that focuses only on the heroes of the Civil Rights Movement of the 1950s and '60s is woefully incomplete. I'm just beginning to learn about the powerful history that's been actively suppressed, wiped from history books and classrooms and the minds of Americans.

Of all the challenges we face today, ignorance might be the most dangerous of all. May we continue to learn, together.

February Split the Plate Offering: Planned Parenthood of Tennessee and North Mississippi

Every Sunday we share our offering 50/50 with a local agency chosen by our members during a vote at the Congregational Meeting each June. This month, the Split the Plate offering goes to Planned Parenthood of Tennessee and North Mississippi.

The first Planned Parenthood chapter in the state was formed in Oak Ridge in 1961, and many of the first volunteers and board members were from ORUUC. This organization provides affordable health and reproductive care to individuals regardless of health insurance,



along with sex education and gender affirming care for transgender people over 18. Following an arson fire that destroyed their Knoxville building in 2022, local staff have continued to provide care via a mobile health unit (an R.V.) WHAT CAN I DONATE?

We'll gratefully accept the following items in <u>resalable</u> condition:

- Clothing & Linens: Washed, no tears, stains, mildewed, or strong odors from cigarettes, pets or moth-balls. It would be helpful to fold clothing and put in clean trash bags.
- **Upholstered Furniture & Area Rugs**: No significant tears, no stains, no mildew, or strong cigarette or pet odors.
- Wood or Solid Furniture: Not broken or badly dented or water damaged, and not missing any vital parts. Minor dents or scratches are acceptable.
- **Televisions**: Flat screens, still in good working condition, less than 5 years old, with no missing nobs or buttons. Minor dents or scratches are acceptable. No big projection TVs or consoles.
- Electronics: Still in good working condition stereo components and speakers, computers only with flat screen monitors.
- Appliances: Only small, still in good working condition such as toasters and microwave ovens, mixers, etc. No missing knobs or buttons. Minor dents or scratches are acceptable.
- Miscellaneous Items: Toys, tools, music instruments, patio furniture and décor items, knickknacks, books (no school textbooks or magazines please,) artwork, clean area rugs, dishes, pots/pans, shoes, antiques, and jewelry.

Things we are unable to accept:



Can Artificial Intelligence Bridge Divides, Or Will it Separate Us Further?



The League of Women Voters of Oak Ridge welcomes the community to Lunch With the League on Tuesday, Feb. 20 from 11:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. at ORUUC. All are welcome to bring their lunch or purchase a boxed lunch for a nominal fee. Coffee and tea will be served. The presentation will begin at noon. This week's topic is Critical Race Theory.

Dr. Michelle Christian is an Associate Professor in the Department of Sociology at the University of Tennessee, Knoxville. She helped develop sociology's concentration area in critical race and ethnic studies and co-founded the Critical Race Collective. Her research and teaching focus is centered on understanding how racism reproduces in the United States and globally and how we can implement antiracist praxis. She is widely published in academic journals and has a forthcoming book that applies critical race theory principles to a global understanding of race and racism with Stanford University Press.

Dr. Dorian L. McCoy serves as the University of Tennessee, Knoxville College of Education, Health, and Human Sciences' Director of Access and Engagement. His research centers on Peoples of Color experiences in higher education. More specifically, he examines how historically underrepresented students and faculty/administrators access and are socialized to academia. His scholarship is grounded in critical theories including critical race theory, social reproduction theory, and community cultural wealth. Dr. McCoy has worked in higher education for 30 years as a student affairs (residential life) and human resources administrator, and as faculty.

Lunch with the League welcomes League members and nonmembers alike to this informative presentation. The League of Women Voters of Oak Ridge is a nonpartisan political organization for men and women. It encourages informed and active participation in government, works to increase understanding of major public policy issues, and influences public policy through education and advocacy.

Coming up...Sunday, Feb. 25 From the Crush of Wealth and Power



Income inequality is a fact of life — the consistent presence of the poor is mentioned in Leviticus, which dates to the 7th Century BCE. Yet in every age there have arisen prophets who call societies to build a more equitable economic system. In the 20th Century, the Unitarian Universalist Whitney Young was the "money guy" in the Big Six leadership pantheon of the Civil Rights movement, and he advised presidents Kennedy through Nixon. Rev. Lisa will lift up the story of this great leader as a frame for addressing justice and equity today.
