Transformation: Imagine the Possibilities

2023 marks 10 years since I started coming to ORUUC. Before that time, I had not attended church in 20 years. I was so nervous that first day I needed to sit and cry at my breakfast table to work up the courage to walk through the door.

Upon arriving, I was greeted warmly by a friendly and outgoing woman who introduced herself as Director of Faith Formation.

She told me her name was Tandy Scheffler. She promptly led me down the hall to the Nursery where I met Susan Rosenbaum. The service included music by Scott Joplin, a tornado drill, and a now somewhat infamous pillow fight during the Story for All Ages. I knew I had found a spiritual home.

As the current Director of Faith Formation, I tear up for entirely different reasons. I had no idea or inclination that this place I walked into would not only be my church but my chosen profession. I'm sure I would have been too scared or too cynical to believe it. But a decade later, here I am.

Although I treasure this memory, it's one of many memories, joyful and

painful, that I have accumulated during my tenure. I had a lot of work to do back then and more so now. In the beginning, I needed to let go of a lot of ideas, prejudices, and hurt feelings to move back into a faith. Now as a faith leader, I must help guide us into a new and uncertain time.

In reflecting on my time at ORUUC, I have come to appreciate the process of change. Specifically, what change can

bring to us in the presence of a loving community. Transformation is mythologized as instantaneous and immediate, the "a-ha" or Come to Jesus moment. Those are wonderful and inspiring stories.

But, transformation is often slow, deliberate, and sometimes painful.

Recently, I came across a saying: Change is inevitable, growth is optional. Transformation, especially when paired with love, creates possibilities for us, but only if we let it. Transformation gives us the unique and precious opportunity to discover our deepest selves and the courage to show that person to the world. It even allows us to become what we have not even imagined yet. I hope 2023 is a transformational year for you at ORUUC.

Volunteer with Ecumenical Storehouse by Michael Bjerke

The Ecumenical Storehouse is a non-profit organization administered by a group of 12 local churches, ORUUC included. Its purpose is to collect used furniture and other household items and distribute them, at no charge, to families in need. Approximately 300 individuals receive our help each year, and we are hoping to expand our outreach. Families are referred to us by either a social service agency, like ADFAC, or by local churches. This makes sure that the service is available to those who are most in need.

There are many ways that you can help with this very necessary service. First, Storehouse volunteers pick up furniture and other items from donors every Saturday from 9:00 till noon, at the latest. Our church is responsible for coordinating volunteers on the third Saturday of every month. This is usually coordinated by Martin Bauer, who can be reached at bauermlb@gmail.com.



There is no training required for this job, just a willingness to help! The items we pick up range from heavy furniture to lightweight, such as linens, lamps, and pots and pans, so don't think you have to be able to lift a sofa to help. Our next pickup day is Saturday, January 21.

Items are distributed from the Storehouse to needy families every Tuesday and Thursday from 10:00 to noon. Each church in the group, or several churches working together, handle a full month of duties, which include answering the phone, helping people choose items, and helping them load up their vehicles.

ORUUC's next month to handle this is March, and we do it together with Chapel on the Hill. As with pick up duties, most requires little training (answering phones is the exception).

Every New Year, my husband and I make time to watch *The Dead*, a wonderful film set in Ireland in 1904 on the Feast of the Epiphany. This is a 1987 film adaptation of James Joyce's short story of the same name that appears in his 1914 short story collection *The Dubliners*. It was director John Huston's final film and it stars his daughter Angelica Huston.

In *The Dead*, teacher Gabriel Conroy and his wife Gretta attend a dinner with friends at the home of his spinster aunts; it's an evening that results in an epiphany for both of them. The screenplay was written by another member of the Huston family, John's son Tony, and the film was nominated for two Academy Awards. It is a beautifully filmed story full of emotion and Irish humor; the setting gives us a real sense of the festive season as celebrated in a Dublin household in the early years of the 20th century. *The Dead* also helps us to reflect on how we learn things about ourselves and others in unexpected ways.

The film, which is 83 minutes long, will be screened on Zoom; we will follow it with a short discussion. Feel free to bring your popcorn! ~Rev. Gaye
