
This Sunday, July 30 One Person's Spiritual Journey: How a Baptist ended up at a Unitarian Church Guest Speaker Esther Dyer

A Music Program Update from ORUUC

Hi ORUUC folks.

We wanted to let you all know what's going on with music at ORUUC as we approach the end of summer and the beginning of our church year.

The ORUUC Board and Exec Team are currently deliberating about what music leadership at ORUUC should look like going forward. It has been determined that a Music Director position consisting of the recently offered weekly hours isn't realistic for the work load required. So, leadership will be figuring out whether a larger, allencompassing Music Director position, or a smaller, more focused Choir Director position is right for ORUUC. Once that decision is made, a job description and search can follow.

Meanwhile, Rev. Lisa has assembled a team of three ORUUC musicians to co-lead the ORUUC music program until the new staff position can be created and filled. Heather Beverly, Ann Odell, and Michael Raymond, in conjunction with the Worship Team and the Worship Leader for that day, will jointly decide on the music and which musicians or groups will provide it for each Sunday.

In addition, each of the three Music Team co-leaders will have a particular focus.

Heather, besides continuing in her role as pianist and choir accompanist, will contact and coordinate non-choir, non-band musicians, such as Liz & Tim, the ukulele group, etc.

Ann, who was a choir director for a number of years elsewhere before coming to ORUUC, will lead the Mighty Choir in rehearsals and on Sundays. The intention for now is to focus mainly on pieces we've sung in the past three years or so, rather than learning a lot of new music.


Michael will coordinate the Mighty House Band. We'll collaborate as we've done in the past, working up our own arrangements of current and new music as needed to fit service themes.

If you or anyone you know would be interested in being a part of making music at ORUUC, please let one of us know!



Petition located in church lobby

For months, a vocal minority in Anderson County has challenged books in our Anderson County libraries and demanded that these books be removed from the library. Through the established process of the Anderson County library system, each challenge has been thoroughly reviewed and the books were retained. In addition, Anderson County's legal officials have weighed in on the challenged books and have found that they do not meet legal criteria to require that they be removed. The Anderson County law director has made recommendations to the Library Board on policy changes to address the concerns stated in the book challenges.

Now the book banners have created a petition demanding that the books be banned. In response, a petition has been written to demonstrate support for the Library Board and our professional library staff.

Through this petition, we aim to demonstrate to our County Commissioners that there is broad community support for our dedicated librarians. Additionally, we seek the endorsement of the County Commission for the changes recommended by the county law director. By doing so, we can establish a united front, fostering an environment that upholds intellectual freedom and ensures the continued success of our libraries as valuable community resources. Please sign the petition (copies are available in the church lobby) and help us safeguard our public libraries for everyone in our community!

The paper petition is intended for Anderson County residents only, and will be presented at the County Commission's August meeting. See information below for a second petition available online.

Ministerial Search Update July 2023

As the summer settles over us like a warm, steamy blanket; the ministerial search committee has begun meeting. Our two gatherings thus far have been very informal, with lots of snacks and ice-breaker questions, mostly geared toward settling into the task before us and learning how we will work best together.


One sentiment we've all shared is the great honor each of us feels at being called to serve ORUUC in this way. Each of us arrived at the decision with thoughtfulness and take very seriously the opportunity to do the hard labor necessary to accurately reflect the will and wishes of the congregation.

One thing we noticed is that the <u>ministerial search timeline</u> that has been shared thus far gets a little murky after the congregation votes on the committee. To that end, we thought we'd share more of a timeline of what search will look like (and what to look out for), including date estimates.

Roughly, the search is conducted in seven general phases. We've already finished phase one (The Good Goodbye) and phase two (electing the search committee), so pat yourselves on the back for a job well done! The next big lift is phase 3, "Building the Structure to Search." Major elements of this phase include.

- <u>August Search Committee retreat:</u> Facilitated by representatives from the UUA, we will make a search covenant and take a deep dive into the roles and tasks necessary for our work on behalf of the congregation.
- <u>September-ish A congregational survey:</u> Thoughtfully crafted by the UUA Transitions Team and regional staff, this survey will be made available to every member of the church and includes questions that emphasize what the congregation needs from a new minister.
- <u>November-ish Cottage meetings/focus groups:</u> Smaller group gatherings, these meetings are an invitation to participate in group conversations to hear and build on what others say about ORUUC.

Phase 4 and beyond will start in winter of 2023, and there's plenty to keep us busy in the meantime. We've created a Ministerial Search Hub in the Members' Section of the website. You can find open meeting recordings, updates, general information, and more. We hope you will bookmark this page and check back often. Until next time, we appreciate your trust and support of us all as we embark on this grand adventure.

ORUUC Covid-19 Update

With the expiration of the Covid-19 national public health emergency on May 11, the CDC has ceased tracking community level transmission because it no longer receives the data needed to do so. Therefore, ORUUC is ending its weekly Pandemic Action Levels (PALs) report. *Masks are not required inside the* **building**; however, if you have symptoms or have had a COVID exposure, please stay home and follow us on Zoom. We appreciate your continued cooperation as we work to keep our community safe and healthy.

One of the nation's most culturally consequential referendums is underway in

Atlanta.

Locals, professional UU organizers, other spiritually grounded activists—including your fellow volunteer UUs—and others from around the world are actively leaning into the work, going door-to-door and at busy community sites to collect the signatures needed to bring this issue to a vote.

The City of Atlanta will contribute nearly \$70 million to the deletion of at least 13,070,000 square feet of the Weelaunee Forest—developing it into a training ground that militarizes and equips police forces with the skills to quell democratic assembly and protest while protecting profit and property. We have two weeks left to show up for democracy, climate justice, and community security by collecting 70,000 signatures to let the people of Atlanta decide.

You can contribute to this referendum from wherever you reside, when—and how—you feel called. This is what UUs do. On August 6th, 1945, the U.S. was the first to use a nuclear weapon in war. Most Oak Ridgers know that our community was a "secret city" whose purpose was to enrich uranium for that bomb.
