UU the Vote ... at ORUUC This Sunday!

UU the Vote – it's become a mantra for our faith. And faith, we know, is an action word.

When I served a congregation in Georgia I joined many other UU clergy in showing up at polling places to make sure all voters had fair access and could vote free from harassment or intimidation. Clergy from around the country showed up in Georgia to

GOTV (Get Out The Vote), knocking on doors and phone banking and generally causing what Georgia's Rep. John Lewis called "good trouble."

The vote margin in Georgia in the 2020 presidential election was fewer than 12,000 votes. I'll always believe that our active faith, rooted in the belief that democracy matters, helped sway the outcome.

When it comes to matters of voting on our own issues, sometimes even actively engaged UUs decide to sit on the sidelines. What's seen as a sacred right worth fighting for (and even, as John Lewis demonstrated on Bloody Sunday in 1965, worth risking your life for) can be seen as a kind of insipid

feature of our current principles.

I'm not suggesting that ORUUC is about to be embroiled in a bloody battle. Thank goodness for people of good will, rooted in love, and their deep work crafting the congregational agenda. Still, it's worth thinking about the centrality of voting in our active faith. To be present and to weigh in on matters that concern our congregation

is a right of membership, and also a responsibility.

If nothing else, at this Sunday's Congregational Meeting you'll be made aware of what the issues are, who the leaders are (including the Search Committee) and what

financial resources are available to us as we move into the crucial year ahead.

I was heartened at the good turnout for the two Town Hall meetings, and those gatherings helped board leaders craft a balanced budget. I hope to see many folks in the sanctuary and the Zoom Room for the Congregational Meeting this Sunday. Your presence, and your vote, matters!

This Sunday, June 11 Under the Microscope and In the Spotlight: Church 2023

There have been other times of massive tectonic shifts that have unsettled religious congregations. (The Protestant Reformation comes to mind.) The last few years have been particularly challenging for religious leaders, who are figuring out new ways to do church while the landscape shifts. The Rev. 










Caring Coordinators for June

Remembering Shigeko Uppuluri

Dear Members and Friends of Oak Ridge UU Church,

ORUUC member Shigeko Uppuluri died peacefully early Thursday morning (June 8). She had been in the care of hospice and was upheld by the thoughts and prayers of her many friends and family as she approached the threshold and quietly passed through.

Shigeko was born on April 9th, 1931 in Kyoto, Japan. She lived in Shanghai, China during WWII, and returned to Kyoto in 1954 to complete high school and college. She met her husband Ram Uppuluri when she was doing graduate work at Indiana University in the late 1950s.

Shigeko and her husband moved to Oak Ridge in 1963 and raised their son, Ram, here. She was a tremendous asset to the community, and to our Church. She was an advocate for peace and was instrumental in bringing the International Friendship Bell to Oak Ridge in 1993 as part of the 50th anniversary of the founding of Oak Ridge. She helped establish Oak Ridge's Sister City cultural exchange program with Naka, Japan.

Next Thursday, June 15th at 7 p.m., all who are able are encouraged to gather at the International Friendship Bell pavilion in Bissell Park for a brief comfort circle honoring Shigeko. A more formal Celebration of Life will be scheduled soon.


The parade will line up at 8:15 a.m. at the old Scarboro School site. Road closure will be at 8:50 a.m. The parade begins at 9 a.m. and is usually 45 minutes to an hour, ending around 10 a.m.

The new parade route will begin at the Scarboro School site, turning right onto Wilberforce (side street Hampton Road at end blocked), turning right onto Fisk (side street Wilberforce blocked), staying straight onto Benedict Avenue (side streets Dillard on right and left blocked), continuing on Benedict Avenue (side streets on Spellman and Bethune Circle Blocked), turning left onto Carver Avenue, turning right onto Wilberforce ending at Mt. Zion Baptist Church and Spurgeon Chapel African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church.

We need volunteers from local churches to serve as individuals standing at the side streets. Safety vests will be provided. Volunteers will hand out water from ice chests to ensure parade participants are not dehydrated.

Transportation is also needed to drive participants back to their departure area to their cars at Oak Valley Baptist Church and Scarboro Church of Christ.

Ministerial Search Committee Nominees



Michael Bjerke He/Him Retired Computer Programmer, ORNL

I retired from Oak Ridge National Laboratory in 2010 after 34 years as a computer programmer. This time in the profession involved everything from punch cards – ask later if you don't know what that means – to data storage in the Cloud. The most important quality in the field was to be open to learning new things and new languages, often over the weekend!

My wife and I joined ORUUC in 1991 because we were looking for some kind of religious community for our two adopted children. We tried several mainstream Christian churches in Oak Ridge, but none were satisfying. When we got to ORUUC, we immediately realized it was a place we would enjoy.

I am hopeful that the search process will give everyone in the congregation, not just the search members, a better idea of who we are now. I also hope that in the future we can continue to practice our values in the wider community.

Retired junior high teacher and Petros Public Library Director

I am currently retired for a second time. In my first career, I taught Junior High Language Arts/Literature for 25 years. I especially loved cross curriculum collaborating -like teaching WWII & the Holocaust in history class while studying *The Diary of Anne Frank* in language class. This made learning fun! In my second career of eight years, I became Petros Public Library director. My focus was to make the library responsive to the needs of a small rural community struggling with drug addiction and generational poverty. Currently, I spearhead a program in my hometown of Petros called *Together We Care*, which prepares a weekly lunch for 50 food insecure, homeless, or homebound locals. We have a team who plan the menus, do some in-bulk buying, and spearhead a wider extended team of friends and neighbors who cook, package, hand-out or deliver meals. I am proud to say that, as of this July, we will have served 50 lunches each Thursday for four years!

My husband, Rickey A. Beene, and I joined ORUUC about 10 years ago. We were both public school teachers in Morgan County feeling the need to find a community where our more liberal values could be openly expressed and shared. Rickey passed away four years ago after a battle with pancreatic cancer, and in his journey, was cared for by ORUUCians who loved him/us and his art. I have continued to be upheld and supported here and have found fast friends, especially in our *Reflections* and *Together in Spirit* groups.

I am sure that I will learn a great deal while serving on this committee-about our congregation, about Unitarian Universalism, about possible futures and a rich past. I look forward to interacting with an exemplar group who represent the diverse interests/composition of ORUUC. I look forward to being part of the process which will bring us an established minister and a renewed congregation. I will do my best to contribute a unique insight and a willing spirit in this process.

I have many hopes for the church of the future. I would hope that "within" our church, we both maintain and expand our bonds of commitment, worshipping in meaningful and lively ways, educating all ages soundly, exploring new directions fully, and expanding our vision beyond the ordinary. I have an associate of nursing from Roane State Community College and a BSN from University of Tennessee Knoxville. I am a Registered Nurse who has worked at MMC in the step-down unit and the pulmonary floor. I live with my husband Rob and our 6 children, 2 dogs, and 2 guinea pigs. I am currently working in the home and enjoy volunteering my time with children and senior citizens.

I came to ORUUC at 22 years old, 15 years ago as a young mother. I found the church through an advertisement in the local paper announcing a banned art exhibit and being raised Baptist, I was intrigued by the idea of a church having banned art on display. I have volunteered in many capacities at ORUUC in every age group of children, working as a host and working to grow the church as a whole. I have facilitated workshops on direct non-violent social action, developing a spiritual path, and immigration as a moral issue. I have led yoga, chaired a social justice committee, and I love taking the teens to the Mountain in my "big van". I have also, in the past, worked on staff as a temporary secretary, as well as the teen and young adult coordinator.
