Terri Gilbert is a Georgia native, having lived in metropolitan Atlanta for over forty years. She earned a BA in English from the University of Georgia, a Masters in English Education from North Georgia College and State University, and an Education Specialist degree from the University of Tennessee. Terri taught high school English at Clinton High School for twenty years before retiring in the fall of 2020, a few months into the pandemic. Terri's art education prior to retirement was limited to one drawing class in college and a watercolor class almost thirty years later. She has been studying acrylic painting for two years.

Although I've always dabbled in painting and crafts, I did not pursue my interest until my retirement. I inherited my mother's art supplies around that time and was surprised to discover a set of acrylic paints among the oil paints I remembered as the medium for her hobby and for my own introduction to painting. Although my first attempts were frustrating, I quickly came to appreciate the versatility of acrylics and they became my preferred medium.

Ours in a beautiful country, and at first I painted just the grand vistas, the majestic landscapes and dramatic skies I encountered in my travels. However, I also find inspiration on my daily walks, observing what runners and faster walkers may overlook – spiderwebs shimmering with dew, insect husks hanging on tree trunks, the interplay of shadow and light on paths and trees, the cloud formations reflecting in the lake, the sudden appearance of wildlife that call East Tennessee home.

In my art, I seek to invite the viewer into those quiet places, to be still, to watch and to be at peace.

Remembering Kenneth Stephen Toth (1934-2022)

Dear members and friends of Oak Ridge Unitarian Universalist Church,

I'm writing today (October 7) to bring you the news of the passing of one of our members, Kenneth Stephen Toth.

Ken was born in Shanghai to a Russian mother and an American father, and came to the U.S. when he was about 16 years old to attend college. He received his doctorate at UC Berkeley where he met his wife Robin at the now "infamous" tequila party. They were married a year or so later, and eventually moved to Oak Ridge, where he worked at X10 as a nuclear physicist.

Ken loved classical music and languages. You could often find him in the living room just sitting and listening to WUOT, a beloved symphony or some old Russian folk music. He was fluent in English, Russian and French, and knew quite a bit of Danish. While he was listening to music, he would also have a dictionary or two close by to look up the etymology of a word that popped in his mind or someone had just used.

He loved a good joke and enjoyed both telling and hearing a good knee slapper (or something a bit racy as well). He loved slapstick and delighted in The Pink Panther movies and Get Smart, and even a good Tom and Jerry cartoon.

He was preceded in death by his wife Roberta Joan Toth and is survived by his children Deborah Wyatt and Kenneth Toth, Jr, as well as his grandchildren Emma Toth, Christina Wyatt (and her husband Eric Hart) and Kenneth Wyatt, and his great granddaughter, Anna Hart.

LGBTQ issues in the Tennessee legislature will be the topic at the next <u>PFLAG</u> meeting, Monday, Oct. 17 at ORUUC. The group gathers at 6:45 p.m. for a social time, followed by the meeting from 7 to 8 p.m.


The meeting will be structured as a conversation with the candidates for Tennessee House District 33, which includes Anderson County. Current <u>Representative</u> <u>John Ragan</u> and <u>Candidate Jim Dodson</u> have been invited to discuss LGBTQ issues.

Oak Ridge has an active PFLAG group which meets monthly, rotating the venue among faith communities including the <u>First Presbyterian</u>, <u>First United</u> <u>Methodist</u>, and <u>Oak Ridge Unitarian Universalist</u> churches, and the <u>Jewish Congregation of Oak Ridge</u>.

PFLAG (formerly known as an acronym for Parents, Families and Friends of Lesbians and Gays) is the United States' largest organization uniting families and allies with people who are lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, or queer (LGBTQ). Its mission is to provide opportunities for dialogue about sexual orientation, gender identities, and to create a society that is healthy and respectful of human diversity.


