Here's to the Idealists

Have you ever been called an "idealist?" Usually the word is a judgmental jab. If you believe the story that idealists can't get things done, allow me to counter the narrative with the tale of British socialist Robert Owen.

Owen must have been called an idealist when, in the 1830s, he started building support for an eight-hour work day. His timing was good: British laborers had been suffering in poverty, hunger and oppression for so long that demonstrations and acts of industrial sabotage were becoming widespread. The standard work day for adults and children alike was about 14 hours. The work week was six days long, conditions were often dangerous, and there was no sick leave or social safety net.

Robert Owen started to make the argument for balance: A human needed to labor with intention and integrity for eight hours, and then have equal time for recreation that could be pursued with equal vigor. Then, eight full hours of rest would restore a person to embark on that balanced journey the next day.

Caught in the gears of the Industrial Revolution, many people saw an eight-hour work day as an unrealistic goal. But then workers started to organize. Robert Owen founded the Grand Consolidated Trades Union, which was the first labor federation. (He also, by the way, is credited with coining the term "socialism.")

Owen had plenty of time to organize, I

guess. Back in his days as a capitalist he'd made a fortune in the textile industry, though even then he was active in improving conditions for workers. Owen came to the United States and used most of his money to buy the town (!) of New Harmony, Indiana, and start a utopian community (the same place George Rapp and his followers had pursued Christian perfection).

Owens' social experiment only lasted two years, dissolving in 1827—which, if you're paying attention, means that Robert Owen did his British labor organizing on the heels of this failed experiment.

Meanwhile, the town of New Harmony lived on. They established the first public library, opened schools that welcomed girls and boys, and and boys, and started a community playhouse. A literary club for women

was founded there, one of the nation's first. New Harmony became a haven for an international community of scientists, scholars, and educators.

Robert Owen ultimately moved back to Britain, but his son Robert Dale Owen went on to become an Indiana congressman who supported workers' rights and women's rights, advocated for the abolition of slavery and for Federal aid to Freedmen.

So here's to the idealists, especially those who labor on behalf of the general well-being of all humans. If you're laboring for a goal that seems achingly distant, take strength from knowing: You're not alone. Like Unionists know, we're better together.

for six homeless families or up to 30 individuals.




Take the Congregational Survey beginning September 8--check out next week's *Exponent* for details!

We'll gratefully accept the following items in resalable condition:

- Clothing & Linens: Washed, no tears, stains, mildewed, or strong odors from cigarettes, pets or mothballs. It would be helpful to fold clothing and put in clean trash bags.
- Upholstered Furniture & Area Rugs: No significant tears, no stains, no mildew, or strong cigarette or pet odors.
- Wood or Solid Furniture: Not broken or badly dented or water damaged, and not missing any vital parts. Minor dents or scratches are acceptable.
- **Televisions**: Flat screens, still in good working condition, less than 5 years old, with no missing nobs or buttons. Minor dents or scratches are acceptable. No big projection TVs or consoles.
- **Electronics**: Still in good working condition stereo components and speakers, computers only with flat screen monitors.
- Appliances: Only small, still in good working condition such as toasters and microwave ovens, mixers, etc. No missing knobs or buttons. Minor dents or scratches are acceptable.
- Miscellaneous Items: Toys, tools, music instruments, patio furniture and décor items, knickknacks, books (no school textbooks or magazines please,) artwork, clean area rugs, dishes, pots/pans, shoes, antiques, and jewelry.

Things we are UNABLE to accept:

- Oconaluftee Indian Village: on the site of a traditional village, where tribal members educate the public about their culture and lifeways (our group will have a private, guided tour) \$20 per adult, children 6-12 yrs \$10, children under 10 free.
- The Museum of the Cherokee Indian: one of the oldest tribally run museums in the US, this museum includes historical and archaeological exhibits, cultural specialists demonstrating crafts and skills, and a bookstore/giftshop with an excellent collection of books on Cherokee culture. Cost: optional (\$12 if you choose to view the exhibits; the bookstore is free to enter).
- Qualla Arts and Crafts store: Across the street from the museum, this store offers the work of native artists from around the US, with a focus on local Cherokee artists. Free to enter.

Scholarship support is available for anyone who needs it. You can also donate to the scholarship fund.
