Tomorrow (Saturday, May 18), ORUUC's incoming settled minister, Lóre Stevens, will be ordained at 3 p.m. EST at First UU Nashville. Attend on Zoom here:

Rev. Chris Buice of Tennessee Valley UU Church in Knoxville will be preaching. Unitarian Universalist ministers must be both fellowshipped by the Unitarian Universalist Association and ordained by a congregation. This is the culminating ceremony which honors the work and support that goes in to creating a UU minister. Lóre is a member of First UU Nashville and was previously FUUN's Membership Coordinator. FUUN sponsored Lóre's aspirant status as she began her journey towards ministry. In UUism, ordinations are not done by a bishop, but by a congregation. FUUN will now ordain Lóre and both parties are honored by their connectedness. Lóre's first day at ORUUC is July 17.

How to Keep a Minister, Part 3 Rev. Lisa Romantum Schwartz, Interim Minister

My colleague Sharon Wylie, known as the 'steel toe boot minister' because her first career was working construction, blogs about church life, including "how to keep a minister." Top of Rev. Sharon's list is, PAY YOUR MINISTER FAIRLY, AND GENEROUSLY. In a UUA survey a few years ago ministers were asked for their top five reasons for leaving a congregation. I expected the results would reveal ministers' frustration with low voluntarism or nitpicky congregants, but no – the number one reason was compensation.

When a congregation is in search it raises the minister's compensation as much as it can. Usually, once the minister comes on board the salary

barely changes over the years. Sometimes congregations try to address the rising cost of living. But remember: Giving a COLA is only meant to keep them even. IT IS NOT A RAISE. And if anyone's going to ask for a raise for the minister, who usually does it? THE MINISTER. It's awkward.

So, say the minister is a good self-advocate, and asks for a raise. Sometimes a congregation sees the minister as a service provider whose job is to make people happy, so church leaders respond to that request by putting together a congregational survey to see how happy people are with this minister. (Church, this is lowfunctioning behavior.)

Another problem is that ministers don't always act in their own best interests. In my first church I knew what our budget constraints were so I didn't often ask for a raise, or even a cost-of-living adjustment. AND NEITHER DID ANYONE ELSE. In effect I funded other congregational priorities with my own salary, even as my skills and the scope of the job increased. And it slowly dawned on me that if I ever wanted to retire, I needed to make a higher salary.

So what's the only way most ministers ever get a meaningful raise? THEY GO INTO

SEARCH. Seriously. If you want to keep your minister, someone besides the minister has to regularly advocate for ministerial raises, without submitting the minister to a "popularity contest" (a.k.a. satisfaction survey) in order to get it done.

Yes, much of this can be generalized to other staff too. UUs are often great advocates for raising teacher pay, for instance, but then pinch pennies with their own staff. Don't even get me started on the "labor of love" aspect of church jobs, which expect part-time employees to regularly go above and beyond their hours and scope of work while "wearing their volunteer hats." If this were required of employees in any other industry UUs would be marching in the streets to protest the injustice.

Does this stir things up for you? I'm happy to have conversations about it. And, tune in next week for another installment of "how to keep a minister!"



Every Sunday we share our offering 50/50 with a local agency chosen by our members during a vote at the Congregational Meeting each June. This month, the recipient is the Anderson County Family Justice Center.

The Anderson County Family Justice Center is a free, confidential safe space that assists survivors of elder abuse, sexual assault, domestic violence, exploitation, and child abuse. Staff help survivors create a safety plan, find emergency shelter, and obtain an order of protection in the most dangerous hours for a victim leaving an abusive environment. They also provide space for survivors to meet with law enforcement, prosecutors, and counselors. FJC helps survivors grow and thrive after their trauma by helping with transportation, resume writing, and referrals to other agencies.




